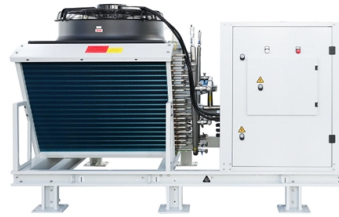

In an electrical panel or load center, the Main Bonding Jumper (MBJ) is the conductive connection that bonds (connects) the grounded conductor (neutral) to the equipment grounding conductor and the metal enclosure of the panel. This connection ensures that the neutral busbar and the grounding. A bus bar is a rigid strip of metal, usually copper or aluminum, that acts as a common conductor for distributing electrical current to multiple circuits within an enclosure. The neutral wire (white) and the equipment grounding conductor (EGC, bare or green) often terminate on bus bars that look.
