

# How much fiber optic cable should be reserved for fiber-to-the-home



## Article Overview

For FTTH deployments, it is recommended to reserve extra fiber strands—typically 10% to 20% beyond immediate needs—to accommodate future growth, redundancy, and potential cable damage.

### Determining Fiber Requirements

Each FTTH connection generally requires two fibers per subscriber: one for transmitting and one for receiving data. When planning a network, calculate the total number of subscribers or endpoints and multiply by two to determine the minimum fiber count. For example, 50 homes would require at least 100 fibers for active connections .

### Spare Fiber Allocation

Industry best practices suggest reserving 10% to 20% additional fibers beyond the calculated requirement. These spare fibers account for:

- Future subscriber growth
- Redundancy in case of fiber breaks or maintenance
- Network upgrades or technology changes For instance, if 100 fibers are needed for current subscribers, adding 10–20 spare fibers ensures flexibility for expansion without requiring new cable installation....
