

How to view the other end of the fiber optic cable

Use a visual fault locator (VFL) to trace the fiber and identify its other end by observing the visible light emitted.

Using a Visual Fault Locator (VFL)

A VFL is a handheld device that emits a bright red laser light through the fiber, making it visible at the far end. To locate the other end of a fiber:

- Connect the VFL to one end of the fiber using the appropriate connector adapter (SC, ST, LC, FC, or MU) depending on your fiber type and connector size .
- Activate the VFL in continuous or flashing mode to make the light easier to identify .
- Observe the other end of the fiber. The red light will be visible through the fiber jacket or at the termination point, even in a rack with multiple fibers .
- Mark the fiber once the light is seen to confirm the correct endpoint. VFLs are also useful for detecting breaks, macrobends, or bad splices along the fiber, which can help troubleshoot connectivity issues while locating the cable's endpoint .

Continuity Testing

Continuity testing ensures that light can travel from one end of the fiber to the other without obstruction:

- Connect a visible light source (VFL) to one end of the fiber.
- Check for light emission at the other end. If no light is visible, the fiber may be broken or improperly terminated
