

High-voltage cables do not always need to be installed in cable trays, but when trays are used, only approved tray-rated or metal-armored cables are permitted, and installation must comply with NEC standards.

Cable trays are support structures for routing multiple cables in industrial, commercial, or large-scale electrical systems, providing organization, accessibility, and maintenance convenience . They are not mandatory for high-voltage cables; alternatives like conduits or direct mounting on brackets are also acceptable . However, when cable trays are used, the cables must be specially rated for open-air tray installation, such as Type TC (Tray Rated) or metal-clad (Type MC) cables . Standard non-tray-rated cables are not suitable due to exposure to heat, moisture, and mechanical stress.

- **Tray Types:** Ladder trays are preferred for high-voltage power cables due to superior ventilation, while ventilated troughs or solid-bottom trays may be used where debris protection is needed .
- **Ampacity and Heat Dissipation:** Cables in trays experience reduced airflow, which can lower ampacity. Close grouping of cables increases mutual heating, and metallic trays can induce eddy currents affecting conductor resistance. Proper spacing and...
