They are commonly made of steel, aluminum, or fiberglass and are ideal for industrial, commercial, or large-scale installations where many cables need to be routed efficiently. A conduit, by contrast, is a closed tube—rigid or flexible, metallic or non-metallic—used to protect cables from mechanical damage, moisture, chemicals, and UV exposure. Conduits are labor-intensive to install and are typically used in areas requiring high protection or code compliance, such as underground runs, outdoor installations, or hazardous environments.

Tray Cables and Conduit Requirements

Tray cables (TC or TC-ER) are specifically designed to be installed directly in cable trays without additional conduit. They are manufactured to withstand industrial environments, including exposure to mechanical stress, moderate moisture, and temperature variations. The National Electrical Code (NEC) allows tray cables to run openly in listed cable trays, provided they are properly supported and protected from excessive damage.
