Article Overview

Neutral and ground should only be connected at the main service panel; connecting them elsewhere creates a serious safety hazard.

Proper Bonding Location

In a standard electrical system, the neutral wire carries current back to the utility transformer, completing the circuit, while the ground wire is a safety path that carries current only during faults. The main service panel is the only location where neutral and ground are intentionally bonded using a bonding jumper. This connection establishes a zero-voltage reference point and ensures that fault currents can safely trip the breaker.

Risks of Connecting Neutral and Ground Elsewhere

If neutral and ground are connected in a subpanel or junction box downstream, normal return current can flow through the ground wire. This can energize metal enclosures, conduit, and appliance frames, creating a shock hazard and violating electrical codes. Such a configuration can also cause erratic voltage behavior, damage sensitive electronics, and compromise the effectiveness of overcurrent protection devices.
